Christine R.: "I divest from the over use and consumption of too much fresh water, a precious finite resource necessary for all life." Let us pray: Refrain: We confess our complicity, forgive and renew us O God.

Nancy S.: "I divest from despair in feeling that it may be too late to make a difference in saving the planet." Let us pray:

Refrain: We confess our complicity, forgive and renew us O God.

Hope S.: I divest from an unfettered trust in capitalism and the addiction to always have and do more. Let us pray:

Refrain: We confess our complicity, forgive and renew us O God.

Julie R.: I divest from my own complicity. I divest from believing that the current ways in which we acquire food, treat farmworkers, and pillage our earth are truly the best and most faithful way to be stewards of our planet home. Let us pray:

Refrain: We confess our complicity, forgive and renew us O God.

Christine J.: With God's help, I work daily to divest from despair. It's a hard thing to do in a world so fraught with violence, neglect, destruction, and fear.

A butterfly magnet holds a quote from American author Sam Keen at eyelevel on my refrigerator so I see it several times a day: "We don't know enough to despair. Despair is hidden arrogance. I have seen the future and it doesn't work." Let us pray:

- Today, as we celebrate Earth Sunday here at Covenant, I began thinking abot the term "Mother Earth" that we often use to describe this amazing earth that we live on. Which made me wonder, what does it mean to be a mother or a parent? Can you tell me some of the things your parents do for you? Or parents, can you tell me some of the things you do as a parent?
- Hearing this, it sure makes sense that we call our earth "Mother" because that it was the earth does for us—provides us with food, gives us life, provides healing when we're sick. Not only do we have adults in our lives whether they be parents or our friends at church who help nourish and care for us, we also have our wonderful Mother earth!
- My friend Tiffany is with us today and she inspires me a lot because she works for an organization that is trying to help us take better care of our Mother Earth. Tiffany can you tell us a bit about the place where you work?
- Let us follow the examples of our mothers and grandmothers and everyone else who shows us what it means to love and to care for another. Scripture Reading: Gospel of Luke 12:54-56 **CHRISTINE R.** (upper eagle)

54 Jesus also said to the crowds, 'When you see a cloud rising in the west, you immediately say, "It is going to rain"; and so it happens. ⁵⁵And when you see the south wind blowing, you say, "There will be scorching heat"; and it happens. ⁵⁶You hypocrites! You know how to interpret the appearance of earth and sky, but why do you not know how to interpret the present time?

Introduction: **Rob** (explain different form of today's sermon, intro speakers again, and use Luke 12 to make the point that everyone should be able to look at the weather/climate and know what is happening. But currently there are strong forces/hypocrites out there blinding us to the ways of good climate stewardship — FF industry. But an exciting FAITHFUL movement is afoot- and today's special guests will use scripture and their experiences to inspire and challenge us in this collective work).

One (ROB): As shepherds and stewards, may we lay down our lives,

All: And rise up to love!

Scripture Reading: 1 John 3:16-18 **CHRISTINE R.** (upper eagle)

¹⁶We know love by this, that Christ laid down his life for us — and we ought to lay down our lives for one another. ¹⁷How does God's love abide in anyone who has the world's goods and sees a brother or sister in need and yet refuses help?

¹⁸Little children, let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action.

Reflection: Patrick C. (Patrick: Hard truths about climate change / Spirit-led Activism/ Harvard students laid down to sleep in this spirit of walking the talk, loving in truth and in action / We too as congregations can do so/ congrats to COTC for divesting)

Response: Glory, Glory Hallelujah NCH (black) 2 For the sake of, all creation, I will lay my burdens down (x2)

Scripture Reading: Gospel of John 2:13-16 **CHRISTINE R.:** *(upper eagle)*

13 The Passover was near, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. ¹⁴In the temple he found people selling cattle, sheep, and doves, and the money-changers seated at their tables. ¹⁵Making a whip of cords, he drove all of them out of the temple, both the sheep and the cattle. He also poured out the coins of the money-changers and overturned their tables. ¹⁶He told those who were selling the doves, 'Take these things out of here! Stop making God's house a market-place!'

One: God is still speaking. This is the word of God,

All: Thanks be to God.

Reflection: Rev. Tiffany C. (Tiffany: The image of Jesus throwing over the tables of the money changers in the temple...and how that relates to divestment...and sharing some reflections from my own experience of how social (in)justice and climate crisis are interrelated (race, class implications, etc) Divestment is turning over the tables of injustice. Harvard Heat Week.)

Response: Glory, Glory Hallelujah NCH (black) 2 Glory, glory, you will free me, when I lay my burdens down (x2)

Scripture Reading: Gospel of John 10:11-17 **CHRISTINE R.:** (upper eagle)

¹²The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away — and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. ¹³The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. ¹⁴I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, ¹⁵just as God knows me and I know God. And I lay down my life for the sheep. ¹⁶I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd. ¹⁷For this reason God loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again.

Reflection: Marla M. (Marla: We are Shepherds of each other. We are shepherds of collective future. The FF industry are wolfs in sheep's clothing. Why Marla is passionate about this work. How her faith drives her. In laying down our lives, we are celebrating that God loves us.)
